Minor party Strategy - Lib Dem, "Independent" & Green

- Present themselves as gaining momentum
- Act like as only party able to defeat incumbent
- Show themselves as the "real" opposition
- Target ward by ward
- Distribute lots of leaflets
- Momentum
- If they win, move on to the next ward
- If they lose, repeat
- Try to get all Remain votes



Basic premise of minor party strategy

- Target single ward first
- Local campaigning via leaflets and local surveys
- All year round newsletters in single wards
- Present themselves as gaining momentum
- Act like as only party able to defeat incumbent
- Show themselves as a voice of opposition
- Momentum
- If lose then repeat
- If win, move to next ward



The Leaflet

- It's regular
- It contains very local news
- Sometimes local adverts
- Has a 'newsy' feel (not too glossy)
- More "community" than political
- Uses tabloid language
- Local pictures
- Often good graphics
- Local surveys
- Casework based





Political tactics for leaflets

- It recognises that there aren't usually enough ideological supporters to win
- Presents candidate as community champion standing up for local area against "Town Hall"
- Aims to squeeze opposition to a) Party in power and b) specific policies, into support for minor party
- Claims credit for any progress
- Presents candidate as different change

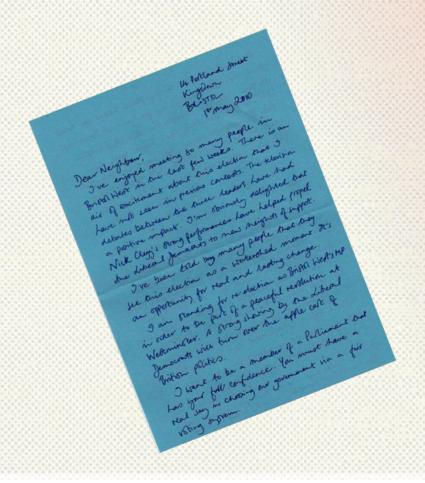


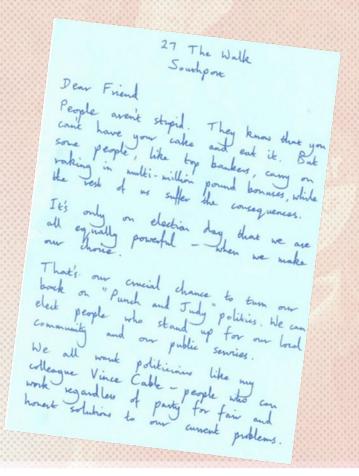


Building momentum

- Show growing support for their candidate
- Show Lib Dems can win last squeeze plea
- leaflet every few days in last 2 weeks
- The handwritten note
- Good Morning leaflet

Pigeon Poo Protest!



Mertin Luckhurst with shop owner David Legal opinion says Network. Rail are responsible for sorting pigeons. The battle to sort out the Pigeon poo under the Clemens St.I. High Street railway bridge has finally moved forward a step. Green Councillors have received a legal opinion from the Council. Case law indicates that Network Rail who own the bridge must pay to stop the pigeon nuisance. Pedestrians and cyclists have had to brave pigeon poo raining down from the bridge since the notting was taken down in

Pedestrians and cyclets have had to brave pigeon por raining down from the bridge since the notting was taken down in Autumn 2015. Despite repeated attempts to persuade Network Rail to fulfil its obligations, it has failed to do so.

Martin Luckhurst thanked the Council's legal team for giving clear-cut evidence that Network Rail are responsible and said "If this pigeon pop problem was affecting the suits of Senior

Managers at Network Rail, it would have been sorted out by now. My message to them is "we're not giving up until this is fixed. It's time for you to accept responsibility and take action."

An Effective Opposition

- "Be wicked, act shamelessly, stir endlessly."
- On page 23, it says:
- "Don't be afraid to exaggerate. For example, responses to surveys and petitions are always 'massive'. If a council is doing something badly public expressions are always of 'outrage'."
- And on page 4, it states:
- "Positive campaigning will NOT be enough to win control of the council."
- On page 6, it says that "you can secure support from voters who normally vote Tory by being effectively anti-Labour and similarly in a Tory area secure Labour votes by being anti-Tory."
- It goes on to say:
- "Oppose all service cuts ... No cut is going to be popular and why court the unpopularity that goes with the responsibility of power?"
- "You are NOT running the council. It's NOT your problem."



Emerging party strategy - Brexit Party

- Present themselves as the "voice of the people"
- Use the media extensively
- Campaign on Brexit rather than any local issues
- Use leader as message carrier more than local candidate
- Ground campaign of leaflets more than voter ID
- Did not stand in May locals but now standing in some local by elections





Taking them on - beating minor parties

- Keep them squeezed
- Don't allow them to be seen as "different"
- Match them leaflet for leaflet
- Claim credit for action
- Surveys, petitions
- VOTER ID and targeting



Taking them on - the organisation

- Build the capacity of your local party
- Be at the forefront of local issues
- Voter ID ALWAYS ASK QUESTION 4
- Target mail shots
- Link to other campaigning organisations
- Be the community champion



Case study – How we won Peterborough

- Extensive conversations with voters before the by election was called
- Asking voters what issues mattered to them
- Campaign was run on the issues that were raised by voters
- Focus was kept on local issues and local candidate.

The Tory Council here in Peterborough recently claimed that they are taking action and reducing fly-tipping.
