

Why we need Women to Stand

- In 2017 the Fawcett Society found that only 33% of councillors are women, and there is little sign of the numbers having increased significantly since then.
- Only 20% of Labour council leaders are women. This is on par with the other
 political parties, but it is not representative of the councillor population or of the
 populations that councillors represent.
- As well as getting more women elected as councillors, Labour Groups need to look at how women are promoted within Labour Groups to ensure that leadership opportunities are open to them, including making sure that there aren't perceived "women's" and "men's" cabinet roles.
